






Announcing Therapeutic Life Story Work (TLSWi) Certificate Cohort #8!


Neurobehavioral Conditions Including FASD:
Understanding & Application of the FASCETS Brain-Based Approach
Wednesdays, September 13-October 18 | 10:00am-1:00pm

This workshop provides information about Fetal Alcohol/Neurobehavioral Conditions(FA/NB) and the effects of alcohol and other drugs on the brains and behaviors of children, adolescents and adults. FA/NB are brain-based, neurobehavioral conditions with behavioral symptoms. The workshop will educate you on a best practices approach for increasing understanding of FA/NB, reducing frustration, and expanding options. Case examples of successful accommodations are central to this training. This is intended for professionals, parents, and other caregivers living or working with individuals who have confirmed or suspected brain-based differences including FASD. Our experience is that the training is enriched by having a mixed group of parents, caregivers, and professionals. The 18-hr series is the prerequisite for anyone interested in becoming a Certified Facilitator of the FASCETS NB Model. Cost: \$480 Caregiver; \$555 Professional. Research Opportunity

Hello fellow ORPARC families! Did you adopt a teenager through the foster care system? If so, I want to talk to you! I'm creating a resource to help future teen adoptions go better. My spouse and I adopted a 14-year-old through the foster care system several years ago. We found there isn't enough support for anybody (the parents, but especially not the teens themselves) going through this unique experience of teen adoption.

A few years ago after our child moved out - he's finishing up community college this year! - I found some time to dig around looking for resources. I learned that there is virtually nothing on this specific niche of teen adoption: adopting a child with a history of family-based trauma at the time in their life where developmentally kids are seeking independence and separation from family. There's plenty of research in related areas, but nothing that is actually specific to people living in that complex intersection - and I think that's a big oversight.

I also noticed that there are a lot of teens waiting to be adopted but not many adoptions in this age group. These kids have been through so much, and it's important we find ways to support them and give them the best options we can for their future.

So that's what inspired me to do this. Basically, I'm talking to parents who adopted teens so I can make something that will provide the support needed for this unique and (I think) overlooked population. My dream is that by making the experience better, more parents will consider adopting, leading to more and better options for teens waiting for families.

I would love to interview you as a parent who adopted a teen! I do interviews over zoom and have plenty of openings in the next few weeks. I provide a \$50 gift card as a token of thanks. This research is approved by Portland State's research ethics board. Everything is confidential and I take every step to guarantee your privacy. I have been doing research professionally for over 15 years so following those protocols is second nature to me.

In this support group designed for LGBTQ+ identifying parents seeking community, participants will share their stories, experiences, and lives in ways that help strengthen their sense of belonging while learning about best practices in navigating the common obstacles LGBTQ+ families face.

Tony, a former foster youth and adoptee, was adopted by a same-sex couple in the mid 1990's. He writes about his experiences growing up as both an interracial adoptee and as a child growing up in a same-sex household in his memoir "The Son With Two Moms" (available in the ORPARC library).



Today, Tony is an advocate for families like his, having served on the Board of Directors for organizations that serve to highlight adoptive families from diverse upbringings, and working with individual families in both pre- and post-adoptive placements. A thought leader in the field of adoption, Tony has been invited to be a speaker at conferences on adoption and foster care throughout the nation, especially those involving interracial placements.



Color and Connection: Healing Through Process Art Submitted by Kim Boyd



Hi! I'm Kim, Director of studioAWEsome. We bring Art, Wonder, Exploration and Story labs to groups of all ages. We facilitate with a trauma-informed lens, inclusively hosting accessible spaces that explore the intersections of art, science, and story. As an adoptive parent, we have been grateful for the resources available to us though ORPARC. https://www.studioawesome.org/

Three of our favorite books from the <u>ORPARC library</u> are:

- The Rabbit Listened (Doerrfield), a beautiful story about how to be a friend to someone who is hurting
- Hey Warrior (Young), one of the most accessible narratives on anxiety for kids and adults alike
- Feelings (Aliki), an illustrative masterpiece that gives space and acceptance to all the feelings

A five-year-old looked me in the eyes while holding her paintbrush and said, "It's magic!" I agreed with her wholeheartedly. I, too, am amazed every time yellow mixes with blue and creates green.

The exploration of color and texture, line and shape is one of my favorite therapeutic invitations. Process (or Experiential) Art is a form of art exploration that lets go of expectation. There is no "how to" or intended final product. Instead, materials and tools are offered and exploration is encouraged.

The kindergartener who found green was part of a Canvas Work workshop I hosted in a local classroom. Students were given a large canvas and a 2" paint brush. They chose two colors and we squirted the paint in squiggles all over the canvas. The first part of our exploration was simply to move the paint around.



In moving the paint, multiple regions of the brain were engaged. The large format encouraged big arm movements. Senses responded to the squishy texture of the paint combined with the scratchy brush against dry canvas. Curiosity emerged with the (often unspoken) question, "I wonder what would happen if...?"



We added more squirts, more colors, and more tools. Over the course of the next few days our canvases grew in color, texture and vibe. The best part? We did it in connection with each other. We noticed the magic on other canvases. We shared stories while we worked.

Exploring with our hands and playing with color helped us feel more calm. Engaging the process without worrying about the end result gave us freedom to explore. Working side by side with one another created connections.

When the brain is given respite from fatiguing executive functions and is allowed time to play, room is created for new connections. Those connections are the building blocks to healing and attachment.

Here are a few of my favorite accessible Process Art invitations. Don't let the simplicity fool you. There is magic in textural, colorful exploration. Set out materials and play. Even better, play together!

Paint Big!

- ✓ Materials: old cardboard boxes, paint (cheap dollar store paint is great), moving-paint-tools (paintbrushes, tooth brushes, flowers, sticks, empty tp rolls.... experiment!).
- ✓ Prep: Gather materials
- ✓ Invitation: Set out cardboard and tool choices. Choose two colors of paint and squirt squiggles onto the cardboard. Explore! Continue with added colors and tools.
- ✓ Extensions: a) Let the paint dry for a day. Return to the project and squirt more color. Play with layers and texture. b) Set the cardboard upright against a tree/wall/fence.



Color mixing

- ✓ Materials: any size clear jars, water, food coloring or liquid watercolor, spoon (optional: pipettes).
- ✓ Prep: Fill four jars with water. Add blue, yellow, and red/pink to the jars. Leave the fourth one plain.
- ✓ Invitation: Set the filled and empty jars on a tray with a couple of spoons or pipettes. Explore!
- ✓ Extension: Trade white vinegar for some of the water. Add some baking powder to a tray.

Noodle sculptures

- ✓ Materials: pool noodle, pipe cleaners (optional: pony beads).
- ✓ Prep: Cut pool noodle into rings or other shapes with a serrated knife. Cut some of the pipe cleaners in half.
- ✓ Invitation: On a tray set some noodle pieces, some long and short pipe cleaners and some beads. Explore!
- ✓ Extension: Add other found objects. Add masking tape.



How did you become an adoptive parent?... Submitted by Summer Hermann





Our family, like so many families, fell into foster care not knowing much of anything. We really didn't know much about foster care outside of what we had seen in the movies. My husband and I had been settling into the life of raising 3 boys who were 14, 11 and 3 at the time. We began our journey into foster care in 2012 when a relative ended up in need of a place for her boys to be while she was hospitalized for a time. During that time the boys disclosed information that led to them being placed into the foster care system and we were thrust unexpectedly into the world of DHS. I will be the first to admit, with a good amount of embarrassment, that we did a LOT of things wrong. We jumped into foster care with no training and BIG ideas about the good we would do. Love and determination were sure to "do the job" and win these precious kids to health and healing. I cringe at the savior complex that I had then... before I knew better. We learned the hard way, as I'm sure many do, that we had

no earthly idea what we were doing! We crashed and fumbled our way through that relative placement and not one of us came out unscathed. That was when the real work began. After that placement we were asked, pretty quickly, to jump the rest of the way in with two children who had suddenly come into care. Still untrained, we said a hesitant "yes" and the rest was as they say history.

We had several short term children in and out along with some longer placements. All of the children who entered our home taught us so many things. We learned to love in a deeper way, a way that hurt and gave way to serving others in a way we hadn't known before. I guess you could say we chose to connect and embrace the hard of loving children who come from hard places. We started out wanting to save the world but we quickly realized we had so much more to learn from these children than we ever had to offer. This is when we began to really understand the need. We got more training and began learning new things and asking for more information. We experienced a lot of hard things through the children that came into our home.

We hadn't thought about adoption initially but as time went on we had a group of children - all from different families placed with us at the same time. This was a mismatched group of children we suddenly found ourselves parenting at that time. Dan and I watched as our former 3 boy crew morphed into 5 boys and 3 girls! In the space of just over 15 months we finalized the adoptions of 5 children ages 12, 4, 4, 4 and 2 years old, this in addition to our 19, 16 and 9 year old boys! We were thrust into the deep waters of parenting our new family which now reflected multiple high needs, and a whole lot of adventure! I still feel tempted at times to spin the story as if it had a story book ending...but that's impossible because we are STILL in the deep waters of parenting.



We were/are a tangled mess of knots and frayed ends...God's still at work untangling and weaving a picture that will be unimaginably beautiful and at the same time IS unimaginably beautiful. We haven't come through foster care and adoption unscathed - in fact we are scarred deeply but it's truly been for our good in so many ways. It's much harder and more intense than we could have imagined but it's WORTH everything; they are worth everything. In times where stories about foster care and adoption can be used as a fad - where some people are emotionally moved by a hard story, we have lived experience with some of the deepest grief and sorrow and have moved past it and been privileged to witness and experience a depth of joy like no other. All of this is said, while still in the midst of the raw and real aftermath of trauma, mental illness, brain based disabilities and more.

Our story I'm sure is not one of a kind. So many families are on similar journeys and they find themselves in the same deep waters. That fact alone has moved us as a family to share our story and hopefully lend encouragement and hope to those we come in contact with. We strive to help our children find their voices and enable them to share their hearts and deep experience with foster care and adoption. Each of them we believe are divinely chosen and woven into this beautiful story with a purpose.
